Introduction

The main objective of this course is to offer students a unique opportunity to explore opportunities available in the School for Conflict Analysis and Resolution and issues pertinent to CAR majors. Topics include the following:

- 1. understand CAR requirements and gain assistance with academic planning;
- 2. be familiar with the undergraduate program's policies and procedures, especially as they relate to the field experience requirement;
- 3. understand how the CAR degree translates to skills in demand in the current job market;
- 4. become familiar with the co-curricular opportunities offered through the CAR program;
- 5. develop a network of supportive peers, upper-class students, faculty and staff and use this network to develop skills needed to succeed in the CAR program;
- 6. to discuss opportunities for study abroad, internships, and jobs;
- 7. to discover ways to develop job skills and practice job search skills

Class Participation

This class is taught in a seminar format. Class participation is essential. 25% of your overall course grade is based on this component of the class. These points are divided evenly over the class periods and are earned by preparing for, being on time, and actively participating in the hour and 15 minutes that we spend together each week. You can earn 2 points each class period. It is expected that you notify the instructor if you will be absent or late, prior to the start of class. If an unforeseen circumstance prevents you from attending class, follow-up communication with the instructor in a timely manner will be taken into account in calculating the participation grade. You will be expected to meet with the instructor to receive the information that was missed and/or do a makeup assignment. It is expected that makeup will take place prior to the next class period.

Reflective Writing

Three times during the semester, you will be assigned a topic to write about. Each response should be appropriately considered with a clear and concise reflection of the topic of discussion. It will be evaluated on completeness and effort. Responses should be approximately one double-spaced page in length, with attention to grammar and proofread for errors.

Outside Events

To broaden your knowledge of the CAR community, you are required to attend a minimum of two CAR events outside of the classroom during the semester. Your grade for each outside event will be based on a summary/reflection paper (summary of the event and reflection of what you learned, gained, or enjoyed by attending) – proofread for grammar and errors, and one page in length. **This paper is not necessary if you report to the class the details of the event and your observations.**

Advising Appointment

In place of a final, this course will require an individual meeting with the instructor. Each student will need to email the professor to set up an appointment for his/her interview. All appointments should be set by April 30. That meeting can be used to discuss study abroad, internships, minors, resume, research proposals, final academic plans including field experience, and evaluate the course effectiveness. Please allow 45 minutes for the meeting.

Honor code: This class operates in accordance with the university honor code. Even though you are encouraged to work together on some assignments and projects, you are expected to submit your own original work. You are required to attend outside events in person and write your own reflection papers. All suspected honor code violations will be reported to the honor committee for appropriate action. The Mason and S-CAR honor codes follow:

This class can be successfully completed if you manage your time effectively, come to class prepared, and turn in work in a timely and high quality fashion.
